

Danielle Flores has a long history in the bleeding disorder community, as in all her life. Danielle's father had severe hemophilia A and passed away from complications of HIV and Hepatitis C when she was 14 years old. Being obligate carriers, her father told her and her sister to do whatever they could for the bleeding disorders community, as this could affect their children someday.

In 2000, Danielle decided to do more than volunteer and became the Executive Director of Gateway Hemophilia Association in St. Louis. From there, she decided to

move her career path to the industry side, which eventually landed her at ARJ Infusion Services (now a Prompt Care Company) in 2010. During her time at ARJ, her passion for the BD community, and more specifically, the nonprofits that serve them, has grown immensely.

She has served on many boards, such as Hemophilia of Iowa, Gateway Hemophilia Association, Hemophilia Foundation of Arkansas and now HFMD. Danielle is the cofounder of Camp Notaclotamongus, GHA's camp for kids with bleeding disorders and serves or has served as walk chair and/or a walk committee member for several Midwest chapters and started the first scholarship program for the Arkansas chapter.

On a national level, she has served on the Hemophilia Federation of America's Symposium Committee and has been a part of their historical archives project and was a member of the National Bleeding Disorders Foundation's (formerly NHF's) Victory for Women Campaign, completing all training levels.

Danielle hopes to be able to use some skills from multiple board development workshops she has participated in throughout the years, to contribute to the ongoing success of HFMD.
